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Goals and Objectives for the Course

To introduce and excite you about basic theories of learning & perception and to teach some of the basics of cognitive psychology. My goal is to have students who become proficient in understanding Psychology as a science and develop critical thinking skills along with domain-specific knowledge.

Expectations

Hard Work!

Successful performance in this class requires regular <u>attendance</u> and a personal <u>effort</u> on your part. In registering in this course, you establish a contract with me to attend class regularly and keep up with readings and assignments. Please arrive and leave class on time. **You are responsible for all material presented in class including announcements made by the instructor.** Schedule personal appointments at times other than when the class meets. Each student is expected to treat others with courtesy. In addition, students should not disrupt the class at any time with cell phones, pagers, or other electronic devices.

This course is only 15 weeks in duration; therefore, we will move at a quick pace. I would recommend looking over the powerpoint lecture before class and printing it 4 or 6 per page to take notes on during the lecture. Then after the lecture read the book with the lecture in mind looking for things to expand your understanding of the lecture material. Do not to fall behind in the reading and homework assignments. If you have difficulty during the course, please see me as soon as possible. I can help you.

Educational researchers believe that for every hour that a student is in class, a minimum of 2 hours should be allocated for studying outside the class. This course meets 4 hours each week, therefore, you should plan to study a minimum of 8 hours each week (outside of class time). Many students find it helpful to form small "study groups" to review the reading material, check on the accuracy of notes, review computational work, etc. Although I will be available to help you, peer-tutoring may also be useful in learning the material. I <u>strongly</u> suggest you join a study group to help you learn the material in this course. There are also many resources on campus that may help you succeed in this class--just ask! Unless I hear otherwise, I will assume you understand the material.

Catalog Description

Four hours of lecture per week Prerequisite: PSY 100

Examines the way people learn, remember, and perceive. Basic learning and perceptual processes will be examined within an adaptive framework. The interaction between individual and environment will be examined in a variety of contexts including memory, reasoning, visual perception, speech & language.

- Use principles of learning, cognition, and perception in problem solving

Grading

1. Exams. Three exams will be given during the course. The exams will consist of approximately 25 multiple-choice and 10 fill-in-the-blank questions as well as 3-6 short essay or diagram questions. Exam 1 will be on 10/1/12 and Exam 2 will be on 10/29/12. There will be NO make up exams so attendance is mandatory. In addition, a final examination will be given. The material in this course builds on knowledge of basic processes and systems so the final exam questions are comprehensive in that I assume you understand the previously tested information. The final emphasizes your conceptual understanding of the material from the entire course and will be the same format as the exams. The Final will be on 12/10/12 and again there will be NO make up final so attendance is required. Bring your Scan-Tron answer sheets and a #2 pencil to each exam session. Academic honesty is expected at all times (see college policy). Cheating on exams in any form will result in an "F" grade on that exam and/or in the course. You will also be reported to appropriate college officials so please do not cheat.

- 2. Online Labs & Quizzes. Periodic quizzes and lab assignments are assigned to do online. The labs will be done in ZAPS and the quizzes will be on the Blackboard website for the class.
