


Welcoming New Faculty

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Spring 2024 Elective Options

In the Spring semester, the Psychology Program will continue to offer classes face-to-face (F2F on campus) and online (synchronous and asynchronous). PSY 337 - Psychological Ethics and Moral Philosophy with Dr. Harley Baker:

This is an elective course that provides students with a comprehensive overview of key philosophical and moral concepts used in resolving debates within psychology as well as in the mental and public health fields. This course also fulfills UDGE-D requirements.

PSY 490 - Topics in Psychology: Positive Psychology with Dr. Barbara

Thayer: This elective course will investigate empirical approaches to the psychology of a fulfilling and flourishing life. Topics include research on positive emotions, happiness, empathy, friendship, goal setting, love, achievement, morality, creativity, mindfulness, spirituality, and humor.

Student & Faculty Accomplishments

Psychology student Ariana Kim served as a CSUCI Summer Research Scholar as part of the UCSB/CSUCI Summer Research Experience. Along with her Faculty Mentor, Dr. Zoe Liberman, and Graduate Student Mentor, Chuyi Yang, she conducted a study on “Can correcting be used as a cue to friendship within children?” and presented their findings at the UCSB Graduate Division Summer Research Symposium in August 2023.



Psychology Professor Kevin Volkan and Vamik Volkan co-authored new book “How the Mind Works: Cases and Concepts in Psychoanalysis and Psychotherapy” which covers many topics, including: psychotherapeutic principles and identity, psychoanalytic concepts, making case formulations and interpretations, psychosocial development, individual and large-group identity, trauma and transgenerational transmission, dreams and unconscious fantasies, therapeutic play, personality organization, cultural considerations, and psychoanalysis in organizations and groups. 


Psychology Club


Psi Chi Honor Society



Summer 2024 Research Experience

The CSU Channel Islands Summer Research Experience at UC Santa Barbara provides mentored research experiences in all disciplines to CSU Channel Islands students who are seeking to gain experience and prepare for master's and doctoral programs at UC Santa Barbara or other UC campuses. This program targets talented and motivated students who can benefit from additional academic support and career development. It aims to foster and support students in scholarly research endeavors to help them achieve their personal and professional goals as undergraduates and to prepare them for their next challenge.

The CSU Channel Islands Summer Research Experience is part of the University of California's *Growing Our Own* initiative. It aims to build sustainable pathways for students from underrepresented groups to the professoriate in California and also help meet California's advance workforce needs outside of academia.

Mentorship

Participants are matched individually with UCSB faculty and graduate student mentors who provide training and support fitted to the individual interests and academic goals of the scholar.

Professional and Academic Development

Participants broaden their professional and academic experiences through workshops, Graduate Record Examination (GRE) training, and presentations to peers, staff, and academics.

Financial Support

Participants are funded as part of their summer research experiences via summer stipend. Housing accommodations or an additional transportation stipend will be provided depending on participants' housing preferences.

Research Experiences

Participants have an opportunity to engage in summer research experience as a fully funded scholar. They are provided with an excellent opportunity to explore their discipline, experience research, and improve their opportunities for future study in their chosen field.
