
Several Psychology students will also be presenting their research on campus as part of the CSUCI Student Research Conference on Saturday, May 4th, 2024

- Harley Baker, Emeritus Professor of Psychology, has been awarded a grant for research on Christian Nationalism through CSU-ERFSA. Prof. Baker's research project, "Different Christian Identities Predict Different Levels of Christian Nationalism," focuses on student religious identities, beliefs, and experiences, Christian nationalism, political ideology, and other relevant characteristics.
- Associate Professor HyeSun Lee has been awarded a grant of \$115,000 through Research and Sponsored Programs (RSP) to fund her project titled, "UNIV 201/301 Undergraduate Research: Becoming a Scholar An Online Course that Accommodates the Needs of Diverse Groups of Students." The project aims to develop an interdisciplinary online undergraduate research course to facilitate the engagement of undergraduate students in research and creative activities.
- Professor Christy Teranishi Martinez has been awarded the WPA Social Responsibility Award. This award is given to a WPA member in recognition of substantial and influential work that facilitates peace, freedom, social justice, community development, and/or protection of the earth's natural environment.


